

OLD ROAN CRICKET CLUB

It can readily be seen from the following reports that the cricket club is going though a period of rebuilding. We continue to field five sides, but with some difficulty. We look to all those who have the good of Old Roan cricket at heart to support us over this phase.

There is certainly one person who can look back on the 1982 season with satisfaction. Nas Khan easily outscored everyone else. His haul included six individual centuries — a club record! Clearly a case of a skipper leading from the front!

On behalf of all O.R. cricketers I should like to record our gratitude to the School for the generous facilities accorded us and to Cyril and Pat for their efforts.

The two skippers had widely contrasting seasons. Nas Khan, as has already been mentioned, stroked his way elegantly into the record books. Graham Lawrance however managed to find himself in mid season with a broken finger, something of a hinderance for a player who was his sides leading all-rounder. This wasn't the only set back. Firstly there was the resignation of Chris Rodwell from the captaincy of both Saturday and Sunday teams, and the unwillingness of the senior players to take on the task. The Sunday side also saw the disappearance of some players who had been the backbone of the team for many years.

These changes did however bring about the appearance of new faces. Peter Ellis showed a lot of promise with both bat and ball and one hopes that next season he will be fitter and more successful. Phil Armstrong batted and bowled with a maturity that belied his tender years. He is possibly the best fielder to come out of the School for some years. Ahmed Khan gave some able performances with the bat, his best being 90* against Blackheath Wanderers only to be denied his century by his brother declaring the innings!

All these changes meant something of a mixed season resultswise. On Saturday in the League we slipped to our lowest position yet. Perhaps this was not so much a reflection of our strength but more the result of the disenchantment that that form of cricket has for some of our players. Our League programme began well with two early wins. We then had to wait until the end of August for our only other success. Nas Khan with 346 runs (ave. 86.5) and Peter Ellis 334 (ave. 30.3) were our main run getters. Whilst Brian Hamer and Graham Lawrance with 20 and 15 respectively were the main wicket takers.

On Sundays we lost 5 games, 3 of which were at home and where we got the worst of the elements. 2 defeats were due to our being much understrength, something that you cannot afford to do when the opposition is Ilford or Broomhills.

We drew as many games as we lost, two of which merit mention. The first game of the season saw Romford and Gidea Park amass 213 for 1. We went about the chase in a professional manner and for much of the innings looked like being capable of getting there. Rodwell hit 63 and we ended up a creditable 200 for 8. The second game of note was played on the shirt front of Midland Bank. Nas led the way with an undefeated 100 and we ended with 230. The bank replied in kind and but for some excellent fielding and purposeful bowling would have made it. They finished on 223 for 6. All this in an afternoon game!

The Sunday side were victorious on 8 occasions with some prize scalps indicating that we are still a force to be reckoned with. These included Four Elms, RACS, Blackheath Wanderers, Warlingham, Reigate Pilgrims, Holmesdale, Catford Wanderers and CUACO. All in all the season was memorable, and we managed to perform creditably despite our limited resources.

The Saturday side with a relatively small nucleus of regulars did not field a settled side throughout the season. The scorebook reveals that 39 different players

batted and there were 20 different bowlers. Hardly a recipe for success. Seen in this light the results were reasonable. As usual the Old Colfeians games both contained their incidents. The first saw Sherman feeding the Peter Williams cut with the boundary not having been reset from the previous day. After some 30 minutes, by mutual agreement, the boundary was moved out some 15 yards. The second match was abandoned as a draw when the umpires were unable to see each other in the darkness.

Two other matches of note: Our modest 125 proved just sufficient for Old Wilsonians who ended on 124! Chris Wyton with 5-61 saw us home in this nail biting finish. Against Crockenhill our 123 for 6 dec. looked very vunerable when our opponents were 70 for 2. It was then that the skipper decided to bring on Graham Lawrance (yes the man with the broken digit), who obliged with 6-20 and a win by 5 runs.

Peter Williams with 350 runs, Graham Johnson 300 and Geoff Thomas 200 were the main batsmen. Of the bowlers Johnson with 32 wkts., Martin Prendergast 20 and Keith Barron 17 took the eye.

The Sunday side, under skipper Mike Baxter, began the season well going 10 games without defeat. This was followed by a bad run when we lost 6 out of 9 games. Though this bad patch coincided with the holiday period an alternative explanation could be that most of our batsmen do not play both days and therefore lack batting practice against the better opposition. With players like K. Calnan, M. Baxter, P. Williams, H. Henning, G. Briscoe, B. Endersbee, V. Lawrence, G. Baxter and D. Baxter we should not have been bowled out by any of our opposition. However, a word of praise for our fixture secretary Graham Johnson. With no heavy defeats or wins he seems to have got the balance just right.

The season ended on a high note with a brilliant performance from Ann Hooker in organising the end of season dinner at the "Riverhead".

The 3rd XI

One problem throughout'82 was raising 11 men and 5 games had to be cancelled through lack of numbers. On other occasions we fielded fewer than the number allowed under

the laws. Invariably this was as a result of calls from higher elevens - and late calls at that. This is not acceptable and the club must take steps to ensure that regular 1st or 2nd XI players are not allowed to get away with a lack of basic discipline.

Strangely the nucleus of the side remained loyal and the team spirit was good. 9 matches were played of which 5 were lost - some outstandingly! - but 3 were drawn and we achieved a fine victory against Griffin.

Under an arrangement with the 2nd XI one batsman was made available each week. Of these the most successful was Bryan Endersbee with two fifties and a 38. Three others are worthy of mention: Simon Hooker played good knocks against RACS and Bardhill. Dave Armstrong showed a brave and improving technique and finished with an average of 18. Les De Hoog despite missing out on the runs for most of the season played a super knock of 29* against Griffin to snatch our only victory.

Risking the charge of nepotism skipper Martin Hooker reports that Matthew Hooker was easily the best bowler taking more wickets than all the other bowlers put together. He lost some of his effectiveness mid way through the season but for a lad of 15 he showed a lot of promise.

OLD ROAN BRAITHWAITE CAMP 1983


