Roan men have, by and large been very keen sportsmen and over the years we have had the pleasure of reporting some outstanding successes in and within many spheres; Glen AITKEN, captain of the school side that won the All England Trophy back in '71 was very instrumental in the FA cup run of his current club Wimbledon when they drew with Leeds.

This year, a Roan schoolboy Dave CAMPBELL played twice for Charlton in Division Two. Many readers will remember that David was a schoolboy prodigy with the Old Boys' sides of two years ago, but at Cricket. Now it appears that he has the difficult choice to make between a University career and that of a professional sportsman.

Further details of all the Old Boys Football teams can be found on another page, compiled by Geoff Sawyer, manager of our first eleven, who claims the dubious distinction of watching three games of football (at least) every weekend for over nine months. As can be seen, another successful season and with the up and coming schoolboys who have made the odd appearance this year the future still looks bright.

Ken Farrer, the most outstanding Old Roan batsman since the war, is now in his second year in the middle east. His mother, Mrs. Farrer, who provides lunches and teas at the pavillion for our cricket teams tells us that Ken's wife and family flew out in March to join him in the hot, humid heat of Dubai for another 18 months. Ken left the Kidbrooke area several years ago and played with Ron PARKER for High Wycome before taking a foreign posting with his Civil Engineering firm.

Still on a sporting note the Old Roan Tennis Tournament, 1976 is well underway; early results show the demise of several 'stars' and despite the organiser's observation that 'everyone gets a bye in the first round' 32 players are involved in the singles. LBC's Steve RIDER has a tricky first round match against Barbara BRYDEN and Gordon BROOKS (Staff) has already been obliged to make an early exit. The favourites Messrs. TOWNSEND, RODWELL and ROWE are still in there and it could be that the winner will come from one of these three. The finals will be held at the club late in September.

Peter MOTTON and his family are visiting this country in late July from Geneva especially to celebrate the baptism of the three children of Reg HODGE, now a teacher in Crayford after several years with KEY Transport; you will remember that Alan HODGE had great success as a motor racing driver back in the early seventies and only serious injury stopped him from completing a successful career on the track. Reg's brother in law, Alan MOSS still plays against Old Roan thirds for Brockley in the South London Alliance — and still gets goals and gives out bruises as Chris WYTON will testify.

The success of the Third eleven is well documented elsewhere though full credit must be given to Kevin HUTCHINS who has made the leap from the sixth to the third eleven; we must congratulate Kevin on his betrothal at Christmas to the lovely Gina Caffell. John HARDY was married on 10 July to Christine, and up until then was playing cricket with Kevin for the sunday third eleven under their new captain Ian CLATWORTHY whose brother Ron CLATWORTHY was captain of the Roan school in the early sixties. John HARDY has been scoring many runs for the Old Boys and will be especially remembered for his 77 to win the match against St. Mary Cray back on May 16 when all seemed lost.

Another successful man with the bat has been the Saturday first eleven skipper Dan CALNAN. Although primarily a bowler he had the pleasant duty of amassing a lot of runs early on in the season for both the saturday and sunday first elevens; up to late June only one game had been lost on sundays and of course a full report will occur in the next magazine.

OBITUARY

The death of Major 'Austin' Dunphy on Saturday 24th April who passed away peacefully in Herne Bay General Hospital, will leave a seat at our annual functions, that cannot be replaced.

Over the last few years my wife and I became to respect this quiet 'little' man, with a big heart. His service to man and his country is so remarkable that I feel a fitting tribute to him is to relate but a short history of his life - a life full - and full of interest. Austin celebrated his Leap Year 80th birthday on 29th February. To mark the occasion he threw a party in his home town of Herne Bay, Major Dunphy has led a most adventurous life. He has been a soldier (winning the Military Cross in the First World War), wrestling champion, immigration officer in Palestine, gang buster in Rumania, journalist and author. He has many links with the City. From 1955 to 1961 was B division superintendent of the Special Constabulary. He retired in 1971 after completing a record 36 years service with the City of London Special Constabulary. Apart from his 36 years service with the City of London Special Constabulary he worked for Beaverbrook Newspapers for many years before retiring in 1972. He spoke Arabic, Turkish, French, German, Russian and Hindustani. His military record includes active service in France, Greece and Macedonia. He took part in the Palestine Campaign before being attached to the Indian army. He was then appointed liason officer with the Arab forces before being sent as a British Agent to Russia where enemy soldiers tried to ambush his train in the Caucasus! Other high spots include intelligence service in Egypt and extensive travels in South East Asia, China and Ceylon where a bridge collapsed into a ravine just as he was about to drive over it in his car. For the last four years he was the Public Relations Officer of 1063 Squadron Air Training Corps at Herne Bay. I was reliably told that he took up this appointment after being retired from the Special Constabulary; he was hoping to do some parachute jumping.

Certainly one would not expect less from this truly remarkable man. May he rest in peace.

A season that started with disastrous results in mid-August sunshine, carrying through with much success and a few disappointments during the Winter months ended on a rather sombre note in mid April. This has been an interesting season with players who were hitherto unknown emerging as stalwarts in the first two elevens. This upsurge of players gaining valuable experience will put the club in good stead for the immediate future and will certainly more than compensate for others who make the break from us to seek higher football. To these players we wish good luck but unless they leave in an honest Old Roan manner they may not have 'Welcome' written on the mat if they return, rather disillusioned, some months later, and may well find other players have established themselves in the top sides. The undoubted strength of the Football Club is the spirit of being an Old Roan and being pleased to represent us at whichever level the Committee decide.

The 1st XI finished sixth in the London Spartan Reserve Div. 1. although it did look that we would finish in the first four until a couple of

lapses at the end of the season, but nevertheless the spirit of the side was the best I can ever remember during my time with the Club - and that covers a couple of decades now! John Stanford and Tim Leask shared the goalkeeping duties with nothing much to choose between them while David Hutley came into the side straight from School and played right back as though he'd been there all his life - as left back Dougie Weaver has!! When Bryan Marsh decided in January to marry Jean (or was it the other way round?) and move away to Essex, we feared that half our side had gone as well as our Captain but events didn't turn out that way Graham Townsend came into the team determined to prove to everyone concerned that he could also be strong and reliable and he's still there so can rest his case. Kevin Todd took over the responsibility of Captain like a duck to water (although he never drinks the stuff!) and his allround game improved to unbelievable ends. Well done Kevin, we'll miss you when you take up your business appointment in Madrid, and are unanimous in wishing you every success.

The midfield section of the side has really worked hard (under the threat of extra training!) but they've certainly appeared to like the outcome of Cyril Davies's devotion, to say nothing of his own proven midfield ability (although he still tells me he's a goalscorer). Don Boon and Keith Thomas in particular have relished more often than not being in the right places at the right time.

The forwards, after the early calamaties, have been spearheaded by Bob Grimwood whose strength and goal scoring ability have caused endless headaches to opposing defences whilst the improvement to the front running of Keith Hedges has been a joy to us all. John Hutley was available for selection far too infrequently for the side is much better balanced when he plays. Chris Rodwell flattered to deceive but will surely come again with the right approach to the game. His abilitiy is there for all to see and he scored many important goals for us although never believing his own worth. Chris, your football future lies at your own feet. Graham Briscoe is still waiting for Dougie Weaver to retire from left back but may have to be patient for a little longer yet but when Graham was occasionaly allowed to express himself in midfield he did his reputation no harm at all. Keith Silcox played in the early part of the season but injury and other commitments didn't help his game.

The 2nd XI had a satisfactory season, perhaps not always getting the results they earned. They supported the 1st XI well with players but in so doing sometimes left themselves short on experience, allowing other sides to dictate games that we could and should have dominated. Graham Briscoe held the reins most of the time while players like Peter Grindley, Steve Mardle, Terry Thurley, Rob Mumford, Chris Winter and Dave Ellis learned a lot in the season and were therefore able to blend with the stalwarts of Old Roan football, Simon Perry, Keith Silcox (when not needed by the 1st X1) and Graham Townsend until his promotion. Here is a team that could

do well next season if circumstances allow them to have a reasonably settled side.

Not very many seasons ago the 1st XI were playing in the Premier Division of the South London Alliance and it is a measure of the strengthening of the Club that the 3rd XI will be competing in that same division, on merit, next season.

After a tremendous start it soon became apparent that they would have a successful season. The side was built round a strong defence consisting of Fred 'Fingers' Fuhr, Frank Gosling, Peter Edwards, Chris Wyton the Captain, and the promising Kevin Hutchins. The midfield of Dan Calnan and Neil Carrick was supplemented by the non stop running of Trevor Puddifoot who had a fine season. The plan was to stop the opposition scoring and get the ball to "Goal Machine" Del Dreher whose 20 goals in 24 matches made the difference between winning and losing matches. Steve Gillman also made an impact once he became established, his ball skills and the knack of scoring important goals, has not gone unnoticed by higher elevens! The return after injuries of Terry Barry and Roger Dale made the selecting of the side pleasantly difficult. In mid season the appearance of Joe Broadfoot for a few games helped the side no end and some of his professionalism was still remembered when he was no longer there.

The match that gave the team the most satisfaction was a 1-1 draw with Blackheath Wanderers which the was the first point anyone had got from them. They won the Division long before the end of the season and we scrambled into second place to earn our promotion with a record that read:

Not content with this the 3rd XI enjoyed the glory of winning the AFA

Minor Cup against Old Fairlopians where goals by Gillman, and Puddifoot
saw us home 2-0. Chris Wyton led the team which a consistency that was
bound to get results and he tells me that the most striking individual performance of the season was given by Neil Carrick in the Semi Final of the
AFA Cup. Well done Neil, but I'm sure the Skipper's resolute play all
season had a big bearing on the success that was enjoyed by all.

The 4th XI although having a team of more ability than normal did not have the anticipated success until the end of the season when a more settled side was maintained. It has been decided however to enter the team next year in the Bromley and District League who we feel will be more receptive to the Club, and also the AFA Senior Novets Cup.

After a very slow and unsettled start the 5th XI eventually began to improve but unfortunately it was then Christmas and useful points had been lost.

The back four finally stabilised with Robin Hills, Mike Titheridge, Jim Bird and Rod Stanbridge. As usual it was difficult to find a regular goal-

keeper and the spot was mainly filled by Ian Clatworthy. Having served their apprenticeships Malcolm Brown, Martin Harris and Ray Westwood were all stolen by the 4th XI and never seen again. Other stalwarts were Keith Berry whose 11 goals gave him top spot, Brian Matthews and 9 goal Mike West while it was nice to see Dave Case having a good season at such a young age. Nigel Potter, Howard Baines and Bernie Hampton also played from time to time.

The team finished midway in their Division and if nothing else enjoyed the games and the action talk-back at the Club afterwards. We will all remember Jim 'Saville Row' Bird having to play in a complete set of borrowed gear one Saturday (his own unwashed outfit having temporarily vanished after the Cricket Supper!?) looking really immaculate, even down to matching socks, but the whole effect rather spoilt by his size 9 feet in a pair of size 12 training shoes! He managed to play well though.

The 6th XI struggled as usual but nevertheless had some useful results, never being really outclassed and continued to enjoy themselves. They can be proud that their sportsmanship has been mentioned more than once by League. Well Done lads.

Having come to the end of the playing side may I draw your attention to the people who really make your Club tick. Keith Thomas has had a few years now as Team Secretary and has earned a rest from that — thanks Keith you've made my job easy as has "Trainer Dave" Hart who has turned out rain or shine to pamper the senior players. Vic Brooker works in such a way that it is all too easy to take his enormous contribution for granted. This we must never do for it would take 3 other people to tackle the work he does in a season. Chris Wyton has emerged as somebody reliable off the field as well as on it while we're gradually working on Graham Briscoe to do something similar. Ian Clatworthy almost single handed carries the administration of the lower three elevens and does a superb job while it was most pleasing to see Mike Baxter take over the Team Secretary's duties for these teams at very short notice indeed. Don Bourne was still involved but to a lesser degree.

Last, but by no means least, may we thank most sincerely our friend Reg Lentle for his understanding at times and the quality of his pitches — thanks a million Reg, we couldn't do without you.

These are all the people (if I've missed anyone I'm sorry) who make the Football Club the enjoyable institution it is, so next time you are leaning on the Bar why not offer one or other of them a drink — they've certainly earned it!
