We congratulate Mr. Harold Gibbons, one of our Governors, on the award of the O.B.E. in the New Year's Honours List.

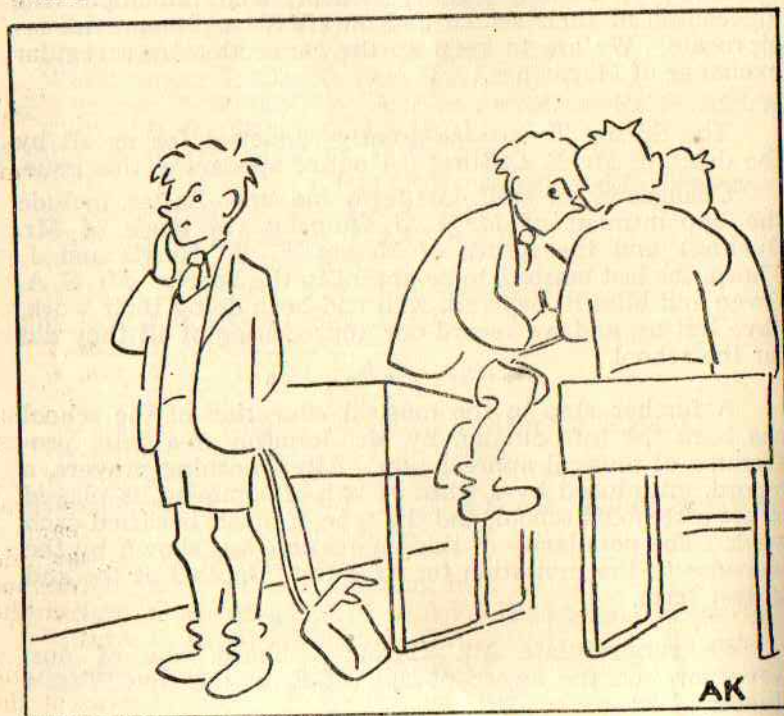

Mr. Beale obtained 1st class Honours in Classics at London University in 1929. He served for some years at Eggars Grammar School, Alton, and for two years has held the post of Senior Classics Master at the City Grammar School, Sheffield. Mr. Beale held a temporary post at the Roan School in 1929 during the absence of Mr. Barratt.

Mr. Hazell obtained the B.Sc. degree in Pure and Applied Mathematics and Physics in 1938. He was at the



Roan School from 1928-35, and afterwards at King's College, London, for the degree and training course. During the war Mr. Hazell has been engaged on meteorological aspects of ballistics under the Air Ministry.

Mr. Brabyn obtained 1st class honours in the B.Sc. Special Examination in Chemistry in 1921. Since 1943 he has been teaching General Science at Parmiter's School.

Mr. C. S. Checkley obtained the B.A. degree with 2nd class Honours, Division 1, at Birmingham University after the outbreak of war, while serving in the Forces. After a period of service in this country and in Gibraltar he was sent to Bucharest where he was appointed Military Vice-Consul with the rank of Captain.

Mr. D. G. Lerpiniere obtained the B.A. degree with 2nd class Honours, Upper Division, at London University in 1945, and the A.K.C. diploma in 1946. He has recently completed his period of training at King's College, London.

## OBITUARY.

### MR. E. DURLING.

With the passing of Mr. E. Durling, who died on February 11th, 1946, we have lost one whose association with the school, as pupil and member of the staff, goes back over forty years, and all who have known him will mourn the loss of a great friend of the school.

"Eddie" or "Durl" to all his friends, both in the school and amongst Old Roans, he has a special place in our memories. He came to the school in 1904, at the age of twelve, and remained until 1909, when he left to finish his education at University College, London. After a short period of teaching, he joined the army in 1914, and rose to the rank of Captain. After distinguished service in France, during which he was wounded, he was demobilized in 1919, and at once took up an appointment as English master at his old school. He was with us when we were evacuated to Sussex and Wales, but in September, 1942, his services were again called upon, this time by the R.A.F.; he did important liaison work with the A.T.C. and was promoted to F/Lt. He returned to us in September, 1945, and his sudden death, so soon after we had welcomed him back, and whilst still in the prime of life, is a sad grief to us all.

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The President of the O.R.A. writes:

"Eddie" was a friend of mine for forty years. In those far-off days in Eastney Street we played soccer in the same team, climbed the rafters and swung on the ropes in the old Gymnasium together. Eddie was always a "sport." When we got into a spot of bother with Titley, Mann, Poyser or Potter (as, whisper it low, we sometimes did) Eddie would never split or shelter behind others. He was thoroughly likeable and dependable—a real boy. When we left school I found myself in a bank, while he went to college en route to his post with the old school. We saw little of each other until after the 1914-18 war, which we both survived without serious damage. I always knew in the years that followed that at any of the Old Boys' functions I was practically certain to feel the jab in the back and Eddie's "Hello, George," and when we both became active members of the Old Roan Dramatic our meetings became much more frequent. He was most meticulous at rehearsals and many a good laugh we have had together. I lost a friend when he passed over.

I shall always remember "Durl" as a good sport, and one who could take, or give, a friendly leg-pull with anyone. He was always one of the keenest supporters of the sports activities of the school. Outside the school, his enthusiasm for the Millwall F.C., of which he was a Director, was well known. His whole-hearted and loyal enthusiasm was infectious, and his care over detail, though providing many good-natured laughs at rehearsals, was always an example to younger aspirants. His many years as Press Secretary to the O.R.A., perhaps not appreciated to the full, showed his devotion to the school he loved.

My own sense of great personal loss must be shared by all who knew him well. His memory will always remain with all who knew him.

Eddie Durling was at his best, I think, when travelling abroad. In 1937 we carried out a long-cherished project and visited together the Flanders battlefields of 1914-1918. "Durl" was in his element, and we painstakingly sought out the precise site of this or that trench, dug-out or dump. Stolid peasants stared as we crawled through ditches and barbed-wire fences: but they usually responded to "Durl's" voluble if somewhat carefree French. Then, after the day's wanderings, and a good dinner, came reflection and reminiscence. I still feel somewhat guilty when I recall how I fell asleep in our room at Cambrai in the middle of a spirited and detailed anecdote which "Durl", having slept most of the afternoon, was retailing in the early hours. His only remark next morning, whilst shaving, was, "You get off to sleep quickly—wish I could!"

He played a lot of lawn tennis at various times: "Durl" was a difficult man to beat at singles; he never slackened his effort, and won many games by sheer concentration. His qualities of concentration and tenacity came out alike in his work and in his play. In modern terms, "a good type" on and off the field.

Indeed, his friendship was well worth having and he had very close ties with all his colleagues. His cheerful, "Hallo, Old Boy!" has been sadly missed.

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#### MR. JOHN HUMPHREYS

Mr. John H. Humphreys, J.P., died at his home in Bromley, in February, 1946, aged 76.

He did a great deal for the public life of S.E. London, as a Justice of the Peace, as a founder-member of the Union Literary and Scientific Society at Lewisham, and as Chairman of the Bromley Amenities Preservation Committee. He was a great walker and an expert on the by-ways of West Kent.

He was known throughout the country—indeed, throughout the world—as the secretary of the Proportional Representation Society. He first became interested in this movement in 1904, following an address given at Lewisham, and in 1913 he became full-time Secretary of the P.R.S. For forty years he fought for what he considered to be the just representation of his fellow citizens in Parliament, and on his death one of the national newspapers spoke of him as a characteristic English figure who "devoted himself with single-minded zeal to a principle he believed in as being just and truly democratic. He did not live to see more than a partial acceptance in the world of his ideas, but, like William Willett and other reformers, he may enjoy greater credit after his death than during his life."

Mr. Humphreys bequeathed a sum of money to his old school to provide a yearly prize for an essay on electoral reform.



**PRIZE DAY, DECEMBER 14th, 1945.**

The guest of honour at the 68th distribution of awards was Sir Ernest Clark, K.C.B., K.C.M.G., a distinguished Old Roan and former Governor of Tasmania. Others present included the Mayor and Mayoress of Greenwich (Councillor A. G. E. Woolven, J.P., and Mrs. Woolven), Councillors G. F. Drakley and Mrs. J. Gollogly, the Rev. Heaton Kershaw, Mrs. A. D. A. Kennedy, Mrs. E. Palmer, Mr. I. T. Pritchard, Mr. C. Bruce, Miss E. H. Barnsdale, Mr. P. B. Dannatt, Mr. J. W. Alton Batchelor, Mr. T. R. L. Gibson and Mrs. Gibson, Mrs. Gilbert, Mr. G. R. Parker and Mrs. Parker.

The Chairman, Councillor H. W. H. Icough, first addressed the assembly, and was followed by the Headmaster, giving his annual report. Mr. Gilbert could claim, with justifiable pride, that, despite the numerous difficulties experienced, every Roan School boy had received a full-scale secondary education during the years of war. The examination results had proved that a high standard had been maintained in school, while conditions were returning to normal in other directions. The Annual Athletic Sports were held at the school ground in July, for the first time in six years, and two Harvest Camps had been held. A number of masters who had been in the services had either returned or were about to return. Of the staff changes, however, the most important was the retirement of the Vice-Master, Mr. Parker, who had taught at the Roan School for over 47 years. The Headmaster paid tribute to Mr. Parker's success in his teaching career and those qualities of reliability and good judgment, with which he had enriched the characters of the 5,000 boys passing through the school during his time.

Before distributing the awards Sir Ernest Clark gave his address. He recalled his early experiences as a Roan boy, largely to interest his audience of pupils, who, he said, were very little different from those with whom he himself had been educated. All youth, said Sir Ernest, possessed those invaluable qualities, Faith and Courage, and could by believing and acting upon Browning's ideal that "A man's reach should exceed his grasp," make their way through life successful and worth while; but it was necessary to remember that "we live by our deeds" as well.

Councillor G. Bruce thanked Sir Ernest Clark for his interest in the school, and the School Captain moved a similar vote to the Chairman and Governors. Councillor Mrs. Gollogly expressed the Governors' appreciation of the work of the staff and Headmaster of the school.

Although the retiring Vice-Master, Mr. Parker, had not been expecting to speak, in response to the enthusiasm of the audience, he expressed his thanks to everyone who had spoken so kindly of him. He said how he had enjoyed serving the school, and that he had always found that the boys treated him as a friend, despite his "somewhat grim reputation." The school showed Mr. Parker how much they valued him and how much they disliked losing him when they persuaded him to speak, and—in listening while he spoke with characteristic brusqueness and irony, of his forty-seven years with the boys—they found the realization of his departure a sad one.

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**HOBBIES' COMPETITION.**

The Hobbies' Competitions, last held in 1939, was revived as part of the Parents' Evening held on Thursday, April 11th. The entries were most encouraging, both in number and quality.

The exhibits in the section covering models were outstanding and showed both great skill and industry on the part of the exhibitors. There were excellent working models, model aeroplanes, and toys, but the outstanding exhibit was the model 'bus garage shown by A. P. Tatt. There were some excellent collections of stamps and birds' eggs. The cookery section was small, but appetizing, and there were most interesting collections of knots provided by the Scouts. The sections covering original work in Music, Art and Literature were well represented and the standard of work was high.

The House Shield for Hobbies was won by Grenville (77 points) with Nelson second (67 points) and Drake third (58 points).

Considering the present difficulties the competition was a great success and we look for more and better exhibits next year.

The Parents' Evening provided a valuable opportunity for the parents and masters to meet and discuss matters of common interest.

**THE HOUSE DRAMATIC COMPETITION.**

The House Dramatic Competition, after a lapse of some years, was held again this year, and the final took place on the evening of the 15th April before an appreciative and



keen audience. Four houses presented extracts and the standard of production and acting reflected great credit on all who took part.

Grenville's extract was put on at short notice and suffered from lack of rehearsal. However, it was a gallant attempt.

Rodney's play was produced by D. Jones and was a very creditable achievement. Domestic comedy is always difficult to play and Jones, ably supported by Warren, as his wife, gave it the authentic touch. The positioning and movement of a fairly large cast were well managed. The humour was well exploited, but owing to a weakness in diction, the point of many of the jokes was lost before it reached the judges at the back. Judging by the amusement of the front rows, had this not happened, the play might have emerged higher in the final order.

Blake also did very well indeed and the atmosphere required by the extract was admirably created. The skill in movement and positioning was very marked, as well as the use of posture and gesture. It was possible to gain a considerable knowledge of the character and profession of an actor without hearing him speak. The extract had a double climax, and after the first one had passed the intensity was not maintained. Knott gave an outstanding performance which tended to overshadow the competence of the rest of the cast. The diction was very good and all actors could be clearly heard. Considering the long absence of one of the principals this was a very fine performance indeed.

Nelson House, the winners, chose an extract with a strong dramatic flavour and did full justice to it. The action ran smoothly up to the climax at the end and this was firmly held. Terrey and Holland did some fine character acting, but the whole cast is to be congratulated on that team spirit which is as important to success on the stage as it is on the sports field.

The judging was done by a committee of Old Boys to whom we would extend our grateful thanks. Points were awarded for production, acting, choice of extract, dramatic achievement and setting. L. W. Richards, who announced the results, gave some valuable hints on acting and production which were much appreciated by the actors and audience alike.

The high standard of production and acting, the excellence of the settings and the improvising of properties and costumes were an indication of the keenness of all concerned, and provided an enjoyable evening's entertainment.

During the Spring Term, when Mr. P. J. 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## THE SCIENTIFIC & ENGINEERING SOCIETY.

This is a newly-formed society, having been started at the beginning of the Easter term. Membership is by election only, irrespective of form, but at the inaugural meeting



it was decided to take all members of this year's Science VI as elected. The purpose of the Society is to arouse and maintain interest in all branches of science, by original papers, visits, films, outside speakers (Old Roans will be particularly welcome) and in other ways. It is controlled by an elected committee consisting of a President (who shall be a member of the staff), an Hon. General Secretary and an Hon. Minutes Secretary, to record all proceedings and transactions in a scientific manner. The Spring Term secretaries were Messrs. Holland and Thorne; the present term's officers are shown above.

Meetings have been held once a fortnight. All general business has been kept to a strict minimum so as to allow as much time as possible for the scientific proceedings. A regular feature of meetings has been the setting aside of a few minutes for the announcement of interesting scientific facts, data or developments. These have covered a wide range of topics, from the propulsion of cars and the manufacture of incendiary bombs from sewage, to the effect of electricity on colour vision.

The Society was started well by a thoughtful paper of considerable length presented by the Hon. General Secretary entitled "The Apparatus of Atom splitting." This was followed by a practical paper on "Radio" by Mr. Thompson. The society is also indebted to Mr. Evans for his paper on "The Chemistry of Photography." A very well-prepared and original paper was given by Mr. Warren entitled "X-rays," which was simplified by suitable demonstrations and lantern slides.

Representatives of the society went to London to a lecture and conference on "Science as a Career for Boys" and brought back a report to the members which was presented by Mr. Harris and was of considerable interest to all. These papers and all scientific facts brought to the notice of the society have been filed for future reference.

At the beginning of the Summer Term the bi-annual general business meeting was held, when Mr. L. J. Berry was re-elected as President. The committee hope to arrange several visits at the end of term, and next year should see some very good papers by some members who are enjoying themselves in research on smoke abatement. In this connection a visit to the Fuel Research Station has been arranged.

### ATHLETICS.

This year has seen an encouraging revival of interest in Athletics; some of our performances have been distinctly promising, and we look forward to a really good meeting on July 6th.

The cross-country races attracted very good entries, and some good running was seen. The courses and regulations were the same as last year. The Junior and Intermediate races were run on the same afternoon, yielding fields of 72 and 47 respectively, with the following results:—

The individual Junior winner was Packer (B), with Jacobs (W) and Crayk, K. (C) second and third; the winning time was 12 mins. 37.9 secs.

The Intermediate winner was Dawtry (D) in 18 m. 42.7 s. (8 seconds ahead of the record) with Red (Ro) and Hole (N) as second and third.

In the Senior race the individual championship was won by Holland (N) in 22 m. 35 secs. (which compares favourably

with the 1936 record of 21 m. 2 secs. and last year's time of 23 m. 26.4 secs.), with Basing (D) second and Hogan (B) third. The house placings were:—

During the season three matches were held for Senior and Junior teams. The Senior team lost to Selhurst (home) by 23 to 13; it is, however, worth noting that the first two in the race broke the record for the course. They also lost to Sidcup County (away), but beat Beckenham County (away) by 18 points to 22. First for the school in each match was Holland in 2nd, 1st and 3rd positions. Regular members of the team were Holland, Basing, Marshall and Johnson. Hole, Hogan, Dawtry and Grimley also ran.

The Juniors lost to Sidcup County (away), but beat Selhurst by 37 to 41 and Beckenham (away) by 6 to 15. Regular members of the team were Jacobs, Crayk, Mathews and Red (who also ran as a Senior). Colours were awarded to Basing, Holland already having them. The school also took part in the inter-schools cross-country match organized by the Blackheath Harriers, when Basing was first home for the school.

The track season is now in full swing and we have had one fixture in which we surprised ourselves by our success. This was a home fixture against Blackheath Harriers on May 13th. Particular mention should be made of the long jump, in which, with no handicap allowance, we took the first two places (Horn and Knott). We also had the first two in the 880 yds. (Lane and Holland), the discus (Thorne and Evans, E) and the 220 yds. (Horn and Grimley). P. J. Evans ran a very close second in the 440 yds. against strong opposition and in good time. Very favourable remarks have been heard concerning this event from several members of Blackheath Harriers who saw it. Horn also ran a good second in the 100 yds. We were unfortunately outclassed in the mile, but felt honoured to race against Sidney Wooderson, the British mile record holder, who won comfortably in a time of 4 secs. below school record; he did not, however, score. Holland took 3rd scoring position. The meeting closed with an exciting relay in which we were beaten only in the last 20 yds. The score was: Roan 47 points, Blackheath Harriers 41 points. Several people have obviously already deserved their colours which will be awarded at the end of the season when we have had our matches with Sidcup County and Beckenham County.



This year's sports will be on July 6th with a reversion to pre-war regulations and medals for all individual winners. The school is also entering in the recently-established contest for the Milocarian Trophy which is open for competition to all the schools of England and Wales.

D. A. Holland is to be congratulated on his athletic achievements, not only for the school, but as a member of Blackheath Harriers. Among his successes were the following: 2nd in the under 21 five miles Championship, 3rd in the Open 2 miles (when Wooderson was 1st), and 10th in the Kent Junior Championship.

#### FROM THE PRESIDENT.

My predecessor, Mr. Holt, had the unenviable task of leading the O.R.A. during those hectic months that followed the cessation of hostilities.

To me falls the honour of being your President during the first real post-war year, in which we hope to welcome home the majority of our Service members, and to revive our pre-war activities.

We plan to hold a Reunion Supper on Friday, 11th October, in the School Hall. At the end of the year we hope to revive our annual dinner; we also propose a dance early in 1947. The Dramatic Society and Sports Sections are also reviving, and notices from the secretaries concerned will be found in this issue.

I should like to be able to announce at the end of my year of office that we have doubled our membership. To this end I ask every Old Roan to recruit a new member. It is up to you, Old Roans!

#### ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING, 1946.

The Annual General Meeting of the Association was held at the school on Friday, 29th March, 1946. Mr. T. Holt presided over a representative gathering of 61 members. Before the meeting commenced the President asked all those present to stand in silence as a tribute to those Old Roans who had lost their lives in the war.

After the Minutes of the Annual General Meeting held on 8th June, 1945, had been read and confirmed, the Secretary, Mr. W. J. R. Bullers, presented his report, in which he said that no doubt everyone had seen the notice of his intended resignation after 15 years in that post. Owing to business pressure he could not give the time that the Association demanded and felt that it would be better to hand the office over to a successor rather than let the Association decline through lack of membership.

The active Membership now stood at 709; Life Members had reached the record figure of 463, which did not include a further 86 who were out of touch; new Members enrolled during the year totalled 60 and the fully-paid up Ordinary Membership stood at 246. During the year endeavours had been made to get back to something like pre-war conditions, Magazines had been issued at regular intervals and it was hoped that shortly the former practice of issuing one each term would be resumed. Efforts were being made, with some success, to get the Sports Clubs going again. It had not been possible to hold the Annual Dinner, but a very successful social evening had been held at the school the previous November and the opportunity was taken of making this occasion one for presentation to four members of the staff who had retired, viz., Messrs. Parker, Poyser, Allen and Kirby.

The Committee had met at intervals and discussed such matters as the revision of by-laws, the Potter Memorial Fund, the War Memorial, the revival of the Sports Clubs and the Annual Dance.

This report was unanimously adopted.

The Treasurer, Mr. Allen, made a very welcome appearance and in his report called attention to the alteration which had been made in the balance sheet whereby the Life Members' and Ordinary Members' Funds were combined



under the name of "Cumulative Funds." The increased balance of £102 17s. 1d. was largely due to excellent receipts from Life Members. However, the same high figure may not be repeated as the more Members transferred to Life Membership now the less there would be to come in the future. He drew attention to the high cost of printing magazines and emphasized that a careful watch must be kept on expense. This report, together with the balance sheet, was discussed at some length, and accepted.

For the ensuing year Mr. George Tomkins was unanimously elected as President, and invested with the collar of office. The new President then thanked the meeting for the honour conferred upon him. Mr. J. W. Berry, Mr. W. J. R. Bullers and Mr. G. R. Parker were then elected as Vice-Presidents in consideration of long and untiring service with the Association. Mr. Allen was re-elected Treasurer, and Mr. Holt, Assistant Treasurer. Mr. H. Baker was elected Secretary, and the office of Assistant Secretary was left vacant. The Auditors were re-elected and five vacant places on the Committee filled by ballot, Messrs. L. W. Loryman, H. J. Townsend, S. H. Hammond, L. E. Trafford and K. H. Wheeler being elected.

The revision of by-laws was discussed at considerable length and the recommendations of the Sub-Committee appointed to deal with this question were unanimously agreed to. The amendment to by-law No. 4, dealing with the rate of subscription, increased the figure to 5/- per annum for Ordinary Membership, boys leaving school and joining the Association after 1st July paying 2/6 for the remainder of the current year, and Life Membership being £2 10s. This alteration to take place as from 1st January, 1947.

Mr. Gilbert then spoke on the proposed War Memorial and it was agreed that a Sub-Committee consisting of the Head Master, three Old Roans, two members of the staff and the School Captain be appointed to consider putting the proposed scheme into operation.

There being no further business the meeting was closed with a vote of thanks to the Chair. The rest of the evening was spent in exchanging reminiscences.
